Headquarters, Battery Kr pt US Artillery Shiloh, Tennessee April 22, 1862

Major Annabel:

In accordance with the requirements of the circular issued by you on April 16, 1862, I submit the following report of recent action in which the battery I am honored to command was engaged.

The Battery has just returned from action against the enemy at Shiloh, where they acquitted themselves admirably. By now, you have heard how the timely arrival of Buell's reinforcements allowed Gen. Grant to sweep the Confederates from the field. I wish to draw your particular attention to the actions of some of "your boys".

Jun #7 was expertly and efficiently fielded under the direction of 1th Sqt. I McHenry, and gunner Cpl. A McHenry. One to a clerical error, Cpl. McHenry was erroneously listed as amongst the fallen, but I contacted his young bride and hopefully averted any distress this might have caused.

As far as the rest of the crew, they rose splendidly to the tash. The front of the piece was expertly worked by Cpl. (Drahe and Pot. Langman. These veteran artillerymen kept the rounds flying hot toward the enemy in support of our infantry boys.

Their dedication to their tashs, coupled with natural good humor were boosts to the morale of the whole center section.

Particular attention is to be given to those on the back of the piece.

You may recall that several members of the 4th Nest Battery A were assigned to our battery. Privates Smeltzer and Supien efficiently hept the piece supplied with ammunition, and Pot. Scott Boggard ably sent them toward the enemy.

Our newest cannoncer, Pot. Fox, showed the natural mettle of a Union Artilleryman. He exhibited poise and calm under fire, and is a credit to his training and natural abilities. When not engaged against the enemy, he independently sought out fellow blacksmiths to further his own abilities.

you would have been proud of the boys in the recent action, and I assure you that they have presented your battery in the finest light to the rest of the Army of the Jennessee. I have no doubt that I will be reporting more of the exploits of these fine cannoneers.
